Mich. I</i>.</p> <p>After the excavations held in Karanis during the winter of 1924-1925, Amundsen grouped the ostraca found in room G of structure 5002 as belonging to the ‘archive of Peeous son of Ptolemaios (and family)’. After its first publication in <i>O. Mich. I</i> (1935), the archive has been reevaluated by the APIS team.¹ The APIS composition of the archive is what we consider a dossier rather than an archive, comprising numerous ostraca from structure 5002 but leaving out those that did not mention Peeous, while on the other hand, ostraca from other buildings mentioning Peeous were added. The archaeological context challenged us to recompose the archive: ostraca which have been found together as one batch in house 5002 (batch in room D, another in room F and a third one in room G) have all been added to the archive, because each batch contains some ostraca of Peeous and hence the entire batch may be attributed to him; ostraca from other structures have been left out.² The archive now consists of 34 ostraca (see App., where the newly added ostraca are marked by an asterisk).</p> <p>The ostraca were discovered in different rooms of structure 5002 (mainly rooms D and G, one in E and two in F). The building contained at least seven rooms and various other objects were found there: glass beads (one of faience), a piece of textile, two glass oil lamps, glass shards, an altar and a writing tablet.</p> <p>The ostraca date from the late third to the early fourth century AD. Precisely dated documents range from AD 288 till 303. Seventeen ostraca are receipts for the transport of grain to a harbour (412, 418, 424, 426, 430, 435, 440, 445, 446, 448, 449, 452, 455, 460, 467, 476, 549). Further texts are receipts for the delivery of grain (168, 169, 560) and chaff (182, 184, 186), a tax receipt (136), a list of names (580), a list of donkey drivers and dike workers (337), two</p>

money accounts (**103, 110**), an account of wool (**255**), a memorandum concerning meat (**265**), a receipt for delivery of eleven doors and a *πτυχή* (**258**), a writing exercise (**697**) and a nametag of Peeous (**644**).³

The archive was discussed by BUCKING 2007, who linked the writing tablet found in room E to **697** and **258**: the former ostrakon discovered in room G is apparently a writing exercise; the latter from room D is a receipt for delivery of eleven doors and a *πτυχή* (a writing tablet according to Bucking).⁴ These three elements prompted Bucking to consider it a public archive of a writing office. However, the acquisition of a writing tablet does not necessarily point to a public building and/or archive.⁵ Bucking's view also does not account for the centrality of Peeous and his father Ptolemaios in the archive. Moreover, *πτυχή* (a variant of *πτύξ*) found in **258**, is an uncommon word for writing tablet in the papyri, that may also denote the leaf (/leaves) of a folding door, which would better explain why it is delivered with eleven doors.

In our view these ostraca belong to a private archive, possibly a professional private archive. Peeous is the central actor, as he appears in about half of the ostraca.⁶ In five texts he is called a *σακκοφόρος*, a porter who loaded sacks of grain from the granary onto donkeys and/or onto the ships.⁷ He acts as an agent of his father Ptolemaios in five ostraca,⁸ and in one of these (**455**), he pays for himself and for his father (Πτολεμαίου ἀπερ(γαζομένου) δι(ὰ) Πην(οῦ)). In a few instances, Peeous acts as an agent for other people such as Valeria Antonia (**424** and **440**)⁹ and Agrippinus, son of Agrippinus (**446**). Peeous, son of Ptolemaios, is further attested in documents outside the archive.¹⁰ Two were found in building 5005 (**496** and **137**), excavated in the same winter of 1924-1925 in Karanis and located near structure 5002. Other documents found in building 5005 mention a brother of Peeous, Ptolemaios.¹¹ The documents and objects of 5005 resemble those of 5002 and may represent the archive of Peeous' brother, Ptolemaios.¹²
